# 1. Ceremony to Mark Federal Government's Grant

As noted in our most recent Newsletter, the Federal Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations, the Hon. Marc Miller, visited the 108 Mile Ranch site of our future cultural centre on March 31st, participating in a ceremony to mark his department's \$4 million grant towards the construction of the centre.

The event was organized at very short notice, but was nevertheless attended by a large number of First Nations representatives and many other honoured supporters of our project. After an opening prayer delivered by Joseph Alexis Archie of the Canim Lake Band and drumming by a group of Canim Lake Band singers led by former Chief Mike Archie, the ceremony got underway with Northern Shuswap Tribal Council Manager of Communications Eric Sennes acting as master of ceremonies. Chief Helen Henderson of the Canim Lake Band welcomed those in attendance and gave thanks to those who had brought the project to its current stage over a period of almost 20 years and of course thanked the Minister both for the grant and also for taking the time to visit us and attend the ceremony.

Chief Helen was followed by Chief Hank Adam of the Stswecem'c Xgat'tem First Nation at Dog Creek and Canoe Creek and Chief Fred Robbins of the Esk'etemc First Nation, both of whom spoke about the significance of the project, what it would mean to future generations of Northern Secwepemc people, and what it would contribute to reconciliation and a better understanding of the history and culture of their people. As an interesting – to your Editor at least – footnote, both these Chiefs held office back in 2003 when they were approached to solicit their interest in what became our project.

Our Society's President Irene Gilbert then addressed the gathering, adding her comments about the significance of our project, and expressing our thanks to Minister Marc Miller for the huge grant that in conjunction with a \$300,000 grant from the Northern Development Initiative Trust (NDIT) will allow us to start construction this year and complete our centre's building by the end of 2023, leading to a projected opening of the facility by early 2024.

On behalf of the Cariboo Regional District (CRD) and the NDIT, both of whose boards she chairs, Margo Wagner spoke of the long-standing support the CRD has provided to the project as well as the financial support provided by the NDIT starting with a grant back in 2005/2006. She turned the mike over to CRD Area "G" Director Al Richmond who has been personally involved with the project since its inception, both as the CRD Director in whose area the building will be constructed, but also as the Chair of the CRD Board for many years immediately preceding Margo Wagner's tenure.

He arrived at our ceremony with a reputation for being sincere and straightforward in his approach to the many complex issues facing him and his department, and nothing in his general demeanour or in his remarks to the gathering did anything to dispel his positive image. Nobody in attendance could have doubted his sincerity about his pleasure at being with us or about the importance he attached to our project. We look forward to his attendance at our opening ceremony in early 2024, if not at some of the milestones during the intervening time.

The ceremony ended with an additional performance by the Canim Lake Band singers.
